the late 1960s and early 1970s

This distinctive period was framed in the tumult of the Civil Rights Movement, the Vietnam War, and a broad counter-cultural revolution felt strongly in the Bay Area. Many students at Berkeley sought ways of making art that would resonate with the times and forces of change. They broke the mold of traditional materials and categories of expression. In the 4th Symposium, alumni will discuss how this period affected their sense of purpose and how discoveries they made during their years at Cal led to the work they are doing today.

Mary Heilmann, now living in New York, will be among the many speakers. Historian and art writer Terri Cohn will talk

on Cal alumni Paul Cotton, Jim Pomeroy, and Sam's Café. Polly Frizzell (aka Marty Carstens) will converse with colleagues about the social and esthetic phenomenon of the Colby **Street House** and the circle of alumnus Michael Haimowitz.

Bryan Rogers, Dean of the School of Art and Design at the University of Michigan, will make a case for alternative modes of art making and teaching in relation to the larger community. Members of the Art Practice faculty at UCB will then address the health of the Department today and, we hope, enlighten us on the philosophy that guides it.

Symposium III: Painting in the '80s

he 2005 Alumni Symposium spotlighted the extraordinary strength of painting in the Art Department during the early to mid-1980s. The particular mix of individuals among the students and faculty of that era created an ethos that stimulated creative interaction and resulted in a legacy to be reckoned with.

The day began with a heartfelt tribute to the teaching of Robert Hartman. (See "Art Alumni Honor Professor Robert Hartman" page 2)

Mark Johnson MFA '82,

Professor of Art at San Francisco State, introduced the three speakers. Each showed slides that helped the audience see how twenty-some years of research has allowed their work to grow. The first speaker was Marie Thibeault MFA '82, who is Professor of Art at Cal State University, Long Beach. She was followed by Deborah Oropallo MFA '82 who had recently been given a mid-career retrospec-

tive at the San Jose Museum of Art. The third speaker was **Rick** Arnitz BA'75, MFA '82 whose work can be seen at the Stephen Wirtz Gallery in San Francisco.

The morning session ended with a no-host lunch at the Adagia, a relatively new restaurant at Bancroft and College. The alumni attending the symposium essentially took over the restaurant, pushing together many of the restaurant's tables for an impromptu two hour reunion party.

In the afternoon session, a panel of alumni artist shared perceptions they have of the 1980s and their circumstances as artists working today: Enrique Chagoya MFA'87, Associate Professor of Art at Stanford; Randy Hussong BA'78 **MA'79** now teaching in the Art Practice Department at Cal; Glen Moriwaki BA'77 MA'79 \mbox{who} is teaching painting at City College of San Francisco; and Luz Ruiz BA'83 MA'85, former Chair of the Art Department

at Diablo Valley College. The discussion was moderated by Jack Hanley MA'82 who operates galleries in San Francisco and Los Angeles. Eventually the conversation on the stage went audience-wide and raised a lot of interesting issues.

Art Alumni Honor Professor Robert Hartman

Possibly the most riveting part of the 2005 Art Alumni Symposium was the tribute paid to Robert (Bob) Hartman, Professor of Art Emeritus, whose years at Cal spanned three decades from 1961 until his retirement in 1991.


Dean Smith BA'84, MA'87, MFA'88, began by recalling Bob's gentle, no-nonsense manner: "Bob worked the most subtle magic.... helping us to see our own process and methods from inside out." Dean then read a letter from John Zurier MA'82, who recalled what Bob had taught him about simply looking: "Volume and space are one-and-the-same and simultaneous. The world is like this. There's never any break in the continuity... Try looking not to change, but (to) what happens during the moment of change." Ethel Mann MFA'88 spoke next. "I revisit Bob's voice in every new work," she said, thanking him for her lifelong love of painting. "He opened the doors of perception, one after another." Mary Snowden MA'65 credits Bob with "understanding better than anyone what was going on in painting at that time," adding that over the years he stayed as intellectually engaging as he was when she had first met him. "One of the hardest things as a teacher," she noted, "is to understand art as it changes over the years."

Bob's response to these tributes was typically understated but profound. "I was extraordinarily lucky to come to Berkeley," he said. "A large segment of that good fortune was the opportunity to work with students who were magnificent. Teaching art is a very delicate matter.

Teaching art may be an oxymoron actually. I'm not sure you can teach it. I think what you can do is set up an environment and an atmosphere that allows art to happen.

That's what I tried to do. And having set up such an atmosphere and environment, it's incumbent on the teacher to not be in the way."

After the symposium many alumni went over to the Triangle Gallery in San Francisco, for the opening of Bob Hartman's new show of painterly aerial photographs.

In Memoriam:

Fred Reichman MA '51, notable painter and art educator whose distinctive works have been widely exhibited internationally as well as throughout California and the Bay Area, died at the age of 80 on October 27, 2005. 
